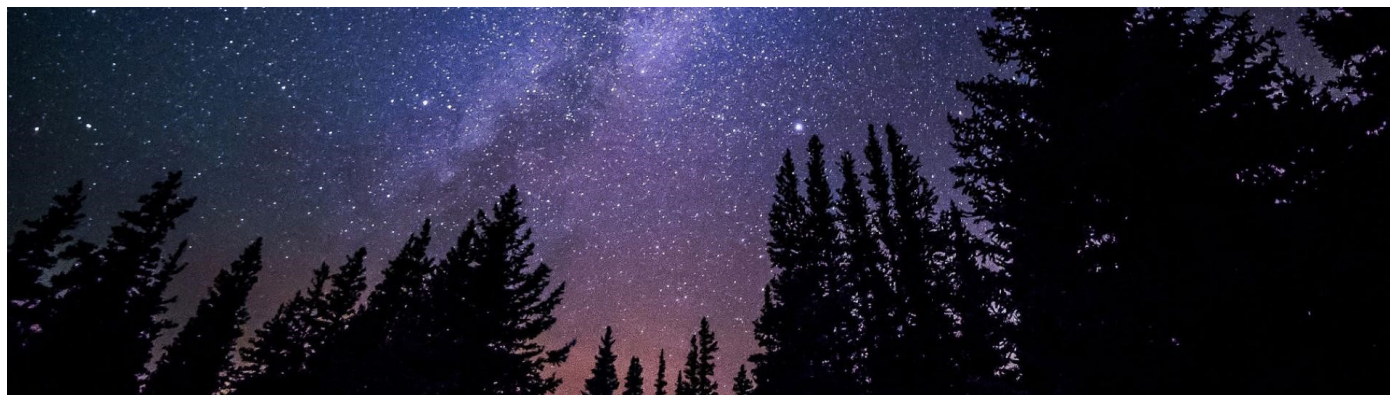

From the Principal

We have recently been celebrating the achievements of many students in a range of competitions and at the assembly this week we presented certificates to students who received High Distinctions and Prizes in the Australian Mathematics Competition.

I would like to particularly recognise and congratulate the following students for their outstanding results:

- In the Australian History Competition, we had two ACT Champions – John Webber (year 7) and Sam Johnston (year 10). Sam was also the National Year 10 Champion in this competition with a perfect score, a truly exceptional achievement. Their awards were presented last week at a ceremony held in the House of Representatives chamber at Old Parliament House.
- We celebrated the achievements of Lily Cai (year 10) and Luke Palmer (year 9). Lily is an ICAS Medal winner in the English competition and Luke is a dual ICAS Medal winner in both the Science and Digital Technologies competitions. Lily and Luke attended the medal presentation ceremony held at UNSW in Sydney this week.

Arts and Technology Exhibition

Last week we enjoyed our annual Arts and Technology Exhibition. The quantity and quality of works on display was outstanding and a wonderful showcase of the talent and creativity of our students across all year groups and disciplines. It was also an amazing reflection of the expertise of our staff who provide rich opportunities to explore such diverse techniques and projects. On the night we also enjoyed the wonderful catering provided by our Food Technology students. I would like to recognise and thank the Arts and Technology staff who have worked so hard to organise all aspects of this community celebration and curate the displays in the hall.

Year 10

We have recently provided our year 10 students with a grade check that summarises their results from both semesters in year 9 and first semester this year. This check is to ensure that their Year 10 Certificate is accurate. We will ask students to do a final check which will include the grades for their current classes in week 8.

I want to emphasise that the **last day for year 10 is Friday 6 December**. Students should attend school right up to this day and any absences should be explained by a parent or carer in the usual way (phone call or email). We have reminded year 10 students that our normal high expectations around behaviour and engagement in classes remain in place.

I am looking forward to all of the celebrations that mark the end of high school for our year 10 students and it is important that these are happy and memorable events for all, particularly for our year 10 students, their parents/carers and our hard working year 10 team.

Assessment and Reporting

Currently, students are working hard to complete their remaining assessment items and staff are focussed on completing their marking and the preparation of end of semester reports. This semester we are implementing the new reporting template provided by the ACT Education Directorate which provides detailed assessment for each student's class against the relevant achievement standards from the Australian Curriculum. Teachers will also report on each student's work habits. As we have undertaken this work, we have taken the decision to not include a teacher comment for each class as the detail now included in the template will provide the information that teachers have previously written about. The implementation of the new template has also provided the opportunity to include student voice into their own report by asking them to complete a self-reflection against the Social and Emotional Learning capabilities that are included in the template.

I also reminded the students at assembly that during this very busy time of the term, they should seek assistance and support early if there are any assessment or wellbeing concerns.

Stocktake and Instrument Returns

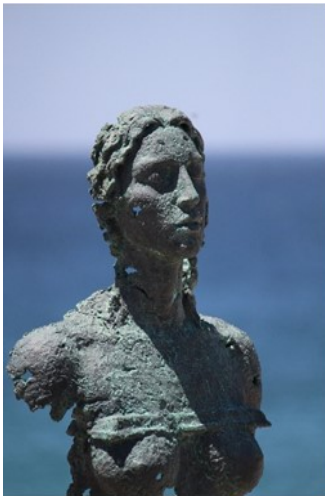

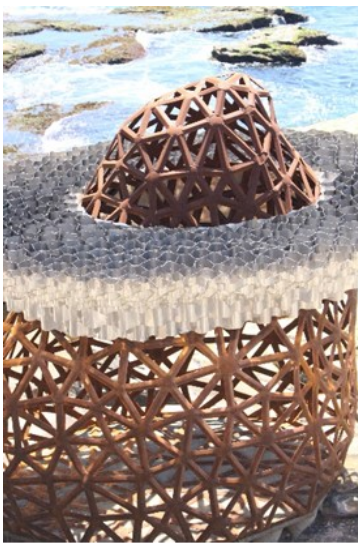

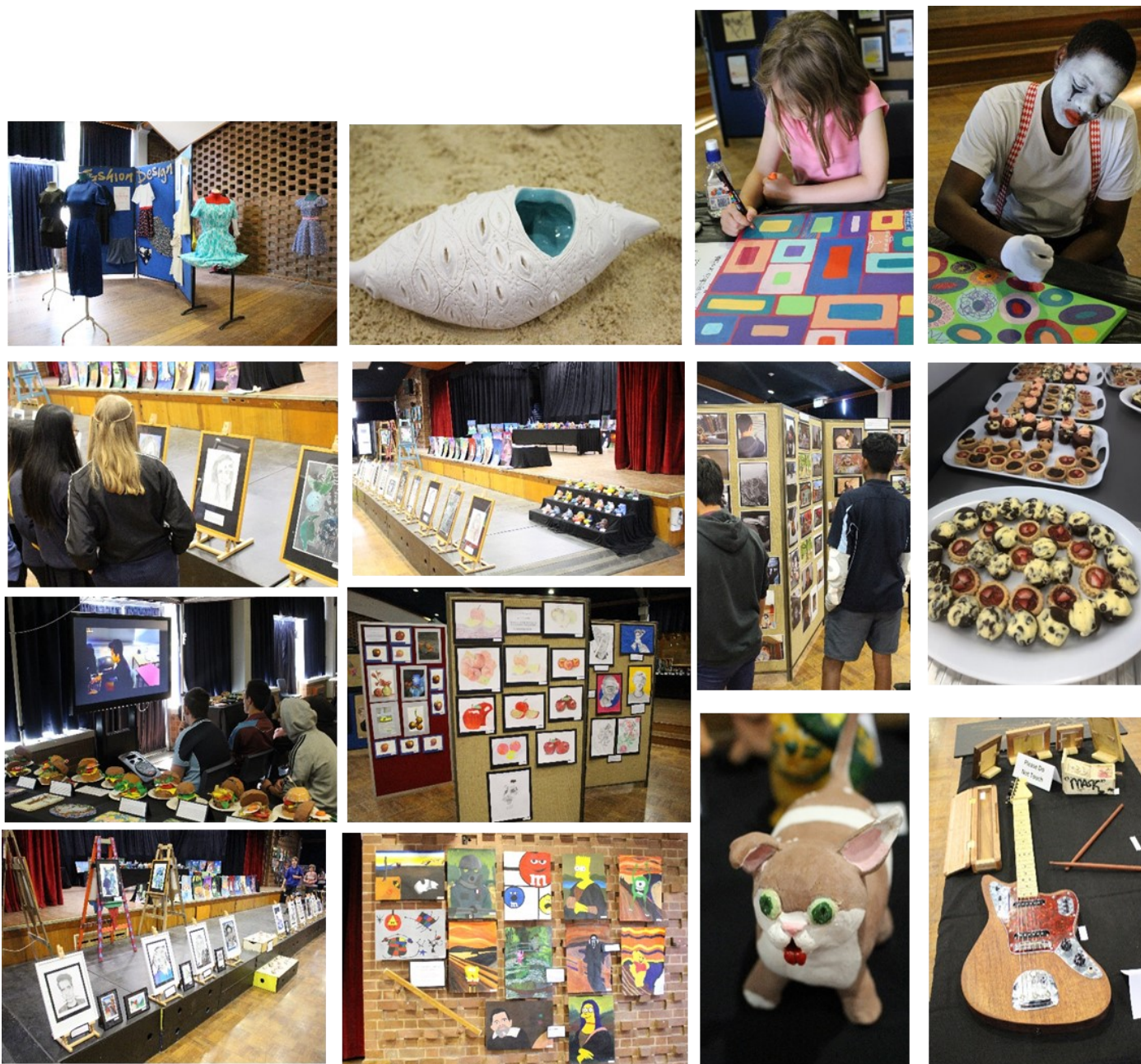




LHS Arts and Technology Exhibition

The extravagant day began with a cluster of (number) excited year 9 students crowding in the main foyer before we embarked on our long-awaited drama excursion. The group travelled cheerfully to the tram stop on where we rode on a crammed carriage to the final station. From there onwards we followed our wonderful teacher Ms Martin to the legendary Canberra Theatre. Upon arrival, we were given a brief but very important safety introduction about the dangers of working in a theatre-like area. The famous musical West End Production had just finished, and we saw firsthand the process that went behind the scenes and packing up. Our group followed our guides throughout the intriguing building as they explained the life behind the scenes and history of the theatre. We sat amongst the 1, 200 + seats and dazed upon the fascinating equipment surrounding us. The students roamed amongst the stage and entered spots the public weren't allowed in. These included the tech box behind and above the audience which where we learnt the difficulties and secrets of lighting and how a major production is run. We also got to travel backstage and in and out of the changerooms, admiring the 55 year old theatre and even go to go under the stage. This was where we listened to stories of different productions in the theatre and conversed about the intricate details and entertainment brought to the city. My personal favourite included a story about an ice performance in the theatre that flooded the building and trapdoors. Next, we travelled to the adjacent theatre called the Playhouse. We conversed about the structures of the 2 theatres and the newer and more advanced technology situated amongst the tall ceilings. We had a great time asking questions and learning about the theatres in Canberra and what happens behind the production. We waved goodbye and thanked our guides and left, well not before taking a group photo of course and marched onwards towards the city mall where we were eating lunch and rode the (less) crammed tram back towards the school.

Australian History Competition and Australian Geography Competition Results

Over 100 of our students tested their geographical and historical skills and knowledge against students from all around Australia in the 2019 Australian Geography Competition and the Australian History Competition.

Over 73,500 students from 792 schools across Australia entered the Australian Geography Competition. All LHS participants achieved good results. Four students achieved excellent results, scoring in the top 1% in their year level across Australia: Ben Dillon (Year 8), Maxwell MacDougall (Year 8), Samuel Teece (Year 9) and Ethan Frosch (Year 10).

We also had two students achieve especially fantastic results in the Australian History Competition: John Webber (Year 7) is the ACT Champion and Samuel Johnston (Year 10) is both the ACT Champion and National Champion. They received their awards and prizes at a ceremony at the Museum of Australian Democracy.

Congratulations to all students who entered the competition and keep an eye out for information about the 2020 competition dates.

French at Lyneham

WINGS 2.0: Women in STEM Mathematics Day

Last week Lyneham High Students attended the second Women in Engineering Day at Hawker College. This event highlights to young women the many careers that are possible in the fields of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). In Australia, only 16% of STEM graduates (Higher Education and VET) are women, and 27% of the total STEM workforce is female. It has become a national priority to role model to young women the possibilities within the different fields of STEM to fill the job prospects of the future.

This event focused on the use of Mathematics and how it is used in many fields of STEM. Along with three other schools, the students participated in workshops about computational thinking, working out satellite orbital speeds and coming up with solutions about how to reduce space debris. The keynote speakers explained their career paths in Geology, Geography and Marine Biology which lead them to become Antarctic researchers. Students also explored a career fair where different universities and companies explained the different pathways to STEM careers.

At the end of the day students were asked to reflect on what they now thought a STEM career looks like. Here are some of their responses:

‘You are not just stuck in a lab; there are lots more outdoor components than I thought.’

‘It seems more adventurous. You go out and do field work and study Geology’

‘STEM Careers aren’t just about being a Scientists and Physicists. You still need cooks, technicians, pilots and electricians to assist in doing the work. There are so many options!’



Market Day - Year 10 Business Studies

Thursday 7 November was Market Day at Lyneham High School. Year 10 Business Studies students were responsible for setting up their own business stall in the hope to make a profit and raise money for our chosen charity **Marymead**.
