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## From the Principal

### 5 Ways Week

### Parent-Teacher Interviews

A reminder that Interim Reports (previously known as Mid Semester Reports) will be emailed to parents early next week. Please remember that Parent Teacher Interviews will be held over two nights in Week 10: Monday 23 September from 4:00pm-7:00pm and Tuesday 24 September from 4:00pm-6:00pm. Appointments are made using the Parent Teacher Online booking system and details of how to access and use this online system will be provided. If you need assistance to make bookings, please contact the front office.

Interviews are 5 minutes in length to provide an opportunity for all parents to speak with teachers. Following a successful trial in term 1, we will again locate staff in the school hall and LPAC each night – a map will be provided indicating where individual teachers are located. We have reminded staff to try to keep to the booking times and ask for your cooperation in finalising appointments on time. This avoids disappointment for parents who are waiting for their appointment to see the teacher. If you feel that you may need a longer appointment, please feel free to contact the teacher after the night to arrange a follow up meeting at a different time.

### Global Climate Strike

Next Friday 20 September there will be a Global Climate Strike event held at Glebe Park in Civic between 12:00pm and 2:00pm. We are aware that some of our students intend to take strike action and attend this event. Many of our students see the importance of adding their voice to the strong and growing call for government to take action in addressing climate change issues.

Lyneham High School will support students to attend the rally, however, we cannot give permission. If your child will be leaving school and attending the Global Climate Strike, please contact us to provide parent/carer approval for their absence. To assist us with absence processing, please notify the school as soon as possible, and prior to this event. ### **Dickson Interchange and walking to/from LHS**

Students that walk between the Dickson Interchange and our school have been asked by me previously to respect the private property of residents that live nearby by walking along the public pathways and not cutting through gardens and parking areas. Some of our neighbours have contacted me recently with photos showing some of our students trespassing on their property. If your child walks this way to and from school, please can you assist us to remind them of our expectations and discuss the importance of representing our school positively in the community.

### **School Uniform**

At the assembly on Monday I reminded all students of our expectation that what they wear to school every day should align with the Lyneham High school uniform, colour code and dress code. Staff will be having conversations with students around school uniform/colour code and appropriate clothing to be worn at school. I urge parents to support our shared LHS expectations by also having these conversations at home, especially if you notice that your child is leaving home not wearing appropriate clothing.

We then walked to the Black Mountain Peninsula where we put our field sketching to work and made some detailed sketches of the Lake Burley Griffin and Black Mountain. We were able to annotate our drawings with our new knowledge of the land.

We have been using this new knowledge in class to help us with our respective assignments.

### Lyneham wins the 2019 ACT Secondary Girls Chess Championship

On the 28 August, five Lyneham High female students attended the ACT Secondary Girls Chess Championship. They competed against 43 other female players from Karabar High, Canberra Grammar School, Radford College, Caroline Chisholm School, Merici College and Tumut High. The Tumut High players making a 400km round trip in order to play.

The Lyneham High team of Lily Cai, Luu Ha Tran, Athena Hathiramani, Saffron Archer and Erin Milne won the event scoring 25.5 out of a possible 28 points.

Lily Cai finished on a perfect score (7/7) and won Best Year 10 player. Luu Ha finished on 6.5/7 and won Best Year 8 player, while Athena and Erin finished on 6/7 and won Best Year 9 player and Best Year 7 player respectively. Saffron finished equal third with Erin and Athena on 6/7 but was relegated to fifth place due to tie-breaks.

By winning the event, Lyneham High has automatically qualified for the Secondary Girls Playoff which will determine which school will represent the ACT at the national championship. Congratulations to all the players. A special thanks to Kate Woodley for helping to organise the event and assisting players on the day.

Through the fantastic performances of our male and female chess players thus far in 2019, Lyneham has won the right to send three teams to the ACT 2019 Secondary Schools Chess Championship to be played on Wednesday the 18<sup>th</sup> of September. Good luck to all those playing.



## Lyneham does well in the ACT Schools Mountain Bike Championships

On Friday 30 August, 13 boys from Lyneham High competed in the ACT Schools Mountain Bike Championships with two teams each in the Juniors (Years 6-8) and Seniors (Years 9-10) categories. The mass start at 10am saw around 671 riders take to the tracks around Stromlo Forest Park. Riders rode for roughly 20-25 minutes before arriving at the start/finish to send the next rider in the teams of 3 or 4 on their way.

Lyneham did very well with the team of Roy Prosser, William Parsons and Joachim Wille-Bellchambers placing 3<sup>rd</sup> in the senior division of almost 50 teams and one of our junior teams managing a creditable 8<sup>th</sup> place out of 78 teams.

Ensuring that a rider is on track at all times is one of the keys to doing well at the event. During the event, one of our riders unfortunately had an accident and was forced to withdraw. During the time the teacher was dealing with the incident all the teams took the responsibility to manage themselves ensuring that a rider was on the track. All the competitors managed themselves very well and should be proud of their efforts on the day.

The competition allows for mixed and all female teams so it would be great to have some girls along for the ride in 2020!

## LEARN TO SAVE A LIFE

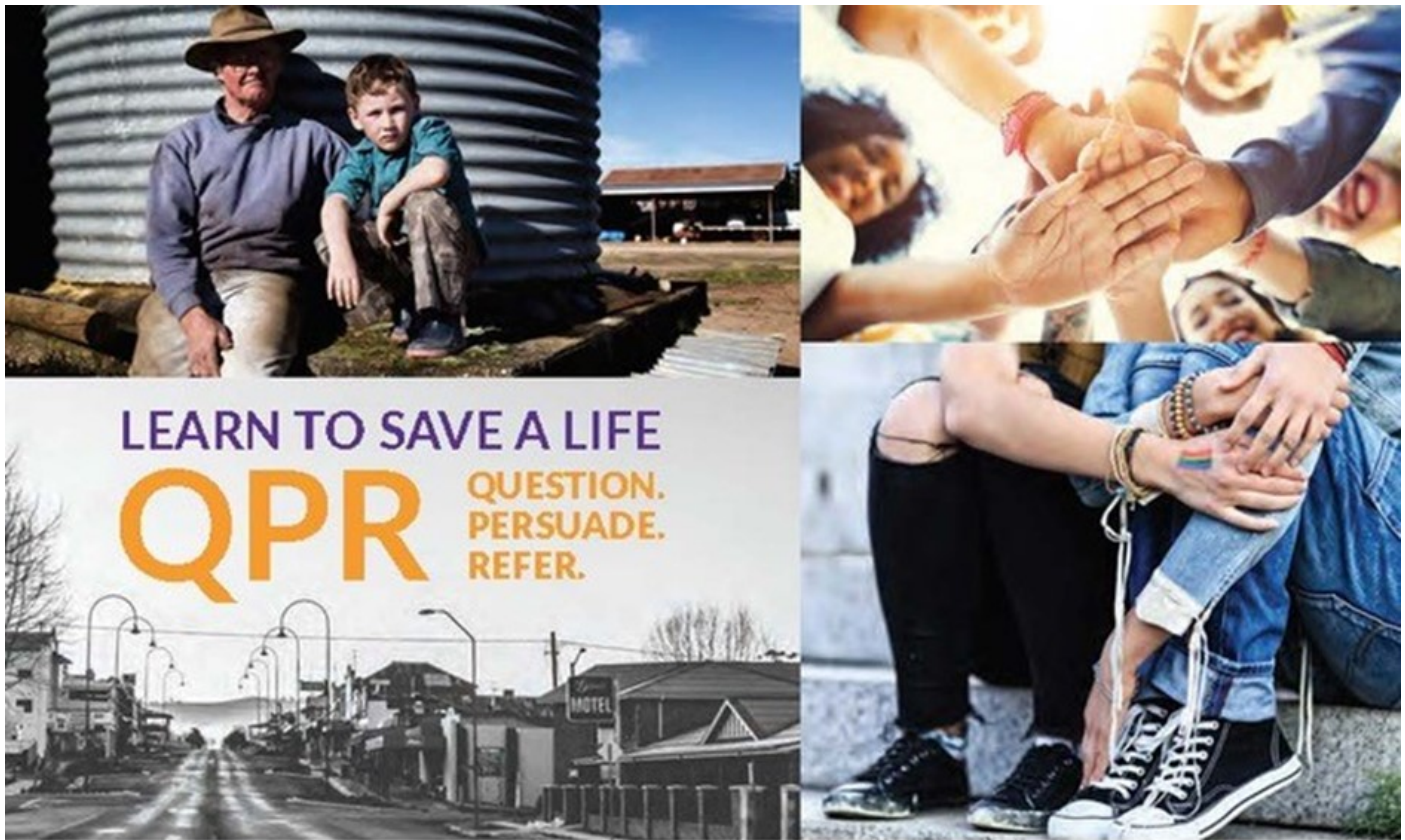
Many people who are experiencing suicidal thoughts communicate distress through their words or actions, but these warning signs may be missed or misinterpreted. We can all be trained to spot the signs. By building a network in our community, we will strengthen our local safety net. Suicide prevention is everyone's business.

[Question, Persuade, Refer](#) (QPR) online training is for people with no assumed knowledge of mental health or suicide prevention.

QPR training will provide you with:

- knowledge and skills to identify warning signs someone may be suicidal
- confidence to talk to them about suicidal thoughts
- connect them with professional care

## Global Climate Action Day Friday 20 September 2019: all ages, all welcome

Canberra school students will take part in a Global Climate Strike on Friday September 20, from 12-2pm in Glebe Park in civic. It is led by the School Strike 4 Climate movement, and the young people are encouraging everyone to attend if they can, adults included.

Not enough action is being taken to curb the climate emergency. The purpose of this global climate day is to demonstrate that people are concerned about the future, and want to see stronger climate action. The climate strike will take place three days before the UN climate emergency summit, on 23 September.

The ACT government has formally given its support to students and their families wishing to participate in the Global Climate Action Day on 20 September. Minister for Education, Yvette Berry, has said attendance at the rally (12pm to 2pm) is learning in and of itself. Yvette Berry has been joined by Climate Change Minister Shane Rattenbury in endorsing the Strikers for Climate Action and reaffirmed the government's declaration that the ACT is in a state of climate emergency. 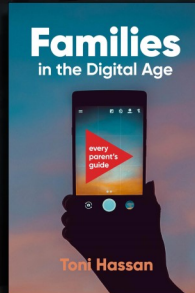

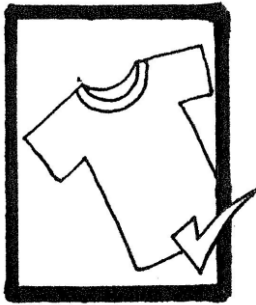

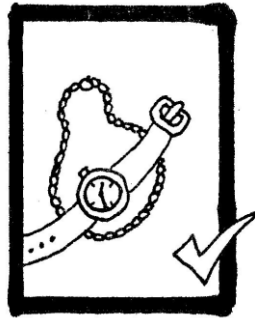
## Acceptable Clothing

Clothes must follow the school colour code: either as an item purchased from the school uniform shop or plain BLUE or plain MAROON.



Tops must be long enough to cover the midriff and have sleeves.

Tank tops, singlets, muscle tops are not to be worn.



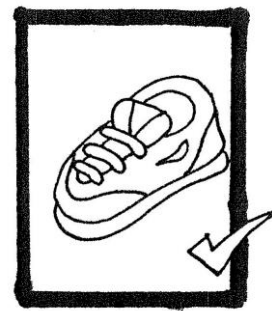
Make-up and jewellery must be kept to minimum.

Spike/stud jewellery or any other item that could be used as a weapon are not to be worn.



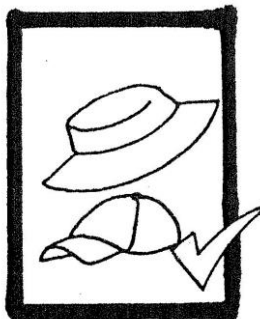
Logos/pictures should be no larger than a 10cm circle.

Pants, shorts & skirts should be dark coloured.

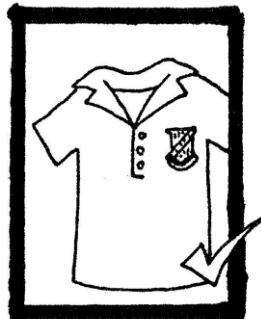


Closed in shoes must be worn.

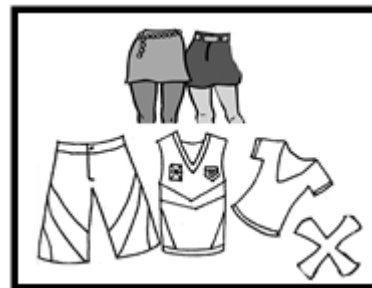
Moccasins, Ugg boots, thongs or sandals are not to be worn.



Hats should be worn outside, but not in class.



Ideally students should wear a school top or jumper.



Skirts & shorts should come to mid-thigh.

Multi-coloured clothes wear including short skirts/shorts, low-cut tops and pants are not to be worn.

## Special requirements:

- PE – white PE t-shirt, blue or black sport shorts/track pants & joggers.
- Science & Technology – long hair must be tied back.
- The SEAL polo shirt is compulsory for all SEAL students to wear to SEAL classes.
- The BAND polo shirt and cap are compulsory for all Band students to wear for performances.
- Students may wear the Band or SEAL polo shirts as an everyday uniform item if they wish.
- Students on the oval or basketball courts must wear the above colour code or they will be required to move to the quad or indoor areas. This policy is to make it easier for staff and students to identify intruders.

Clothing with racist, sexist, anti-social or inappropriate images or slogans are not to be worn at any time.

# Information About Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR)

## What Is Question, Persuade, Refer?

*Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR)* is an evidence based online suicide prevention training being made available in the ACT through the ACT LifeSpan initiative. The training was developed by the QPR Institute and has been modified for Australian audiences in collaboration with Black Dog Institute.

*Question, Persuade, Refer (QPR)* was developed for people with no assumed knowledge of mental health or suicide prevention. It teaches people to recognise and respond effectively to someone exhibiting suicide warning signs and behaviours and connect the person in need of help with the right professional care.

QPR online takes approximately 60 minutes to complete and can be done over multiple sessions. Once you have finished QPR you can continue to access the program for 3 years to refresh your skills and knowledge. The web-based course is delivered through a mixture of videos, written content and quizzes and covers:

- common myths and misconceptions about suicide
- warning signs of suicide
- how to ask someone whether they are experiencing suicidal ideation
- how to persuade someone to stay alive
- how to refer individuals to appropriate professional help

A printable QPR booklet is also made available to download, providing more detailed reference materials and guidance. This training is being made available for free to school staff and families through the following process.
